As promised, the New Jersey Department of Transportation (NJDOT) has reviewed Morristown's request to extend outdoor dining until Sunday, November 1, 2020. As I know you understand, the request had to be reviewed in the context of other towns that have made similar requests.

Inasmuch as Morristown has not constructed any parklets/platforms, and can easily clear the State highways, and side roads in the event of a forecast for inclement weather to which NJDOT would be required to respond, the extension requests are approved. Please note, however, this is the final extension, as the Department must have the full ability to respond, as described above, on a moment's notice.

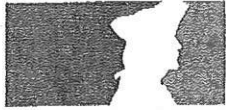

Commissioner Gutierrez-Scaccetti,

I'm disappointed that NJDOT has only approved permits for on-street outside dining through October 15, 2020. The Town of Morristown asks that you reconsider our request for an extension of permits allowing on-street outside dining (i.e. parklets) to continue through Sunday, November 1, 2020. Extended outdoor dining has proven a lifeline to the many restaurants in Town that have taken advantage of it, and it's continuance through mid-fall will further bolster their ability to stay in business and recoup some of the revenue lost during the shutdown earlier this year. Though limited indoor dining is now permitted, the 25% capacity limit makes indoor dining infeasible for many of our smaller businesses and supplementation with continued outdoor dining is critical to their financial stability. Further, many diners are simply not ready to venture indoors, particularly as the weather remains pleasant enough to be seated in open air and restaurateurs have already invested in additional equipment like heaters to provide additional comfort for diners outdoors.

Continuation through Sunday, November 1<sup>st</sup> gives our restaurants 3 more full weekends of additional business including Halloween, which is a popular holiday for restaurants in Morristown.

Allowing the continued use of expanded dining areas in curbside parking spaces is critical to the continued resurgence of our local restaurants. I hope that you consider our request for the wellbeing of our businesses and stability of our downtown.
